Last May's Garden tour was a success! By my accounting, we had \$12,935.92 in income and \$3,538.85 in expenses, mainly the luncheon, giving us a profit of \$9,397.07. This money went to our building fund for clubhouse maintenance expenses.

In August, we took a tour of the Riverton crape myrtle trees with Barry Emens, head of our Shade Tree Commission and husband of our member June Emens. It was informative and it was a nice day for a walk.

Our luncheon to start the season was held at Pat Brunker's house on September 11. Twenty of us enjoyed an afternoon of catching up with each other and talking about improvements to the Garden Tour and our schedule for this coming year.

In September we had a joint pro-

History Corner

Pat Brunker, Porch Club Historian

If you look at the first page of the Directory, you will see that The Porch Club was a member of the General Federation from 1908 to 1928, then there is a gap from 1928 to 1934. These were the years of the great Depression in the US. In 1928, the Porch Club withdrew from the General Federation in protest of their dues being increased to 25 cents per person per year. With approximately 150 members at the time, that cost would have been \$37.50.

This protest seems a bit misplaced

because also in 1928/1929 the clubhouse was refurnished with: "One dozen Windsor chairs, a davenport, end tables, lamps, a tea table, two formal chairs, one mirror, glass curtains and \$150 for kitchen items including a gas hot water heater, 'range dishes' and cooking utensils. In 1929, the Porch Club furnished a room in Burlington County Hospital in memory of Mrs. Alexander Marcy. Lights were added on the side porch that same year and in 1930, a contract was awarded to

George Shaner for \$2031.50 to enclose the porch facing Howard Street and enlarge the clubroom by removing the balcony. A lot of improvements and expenses took place during these years.

The slight increase in the General Federation dues seems minor by comparison. In 1934, the Porch Club re-joined the General Foundation and has continued to belong until today. Our current dues to the General Federation are \$15 per person per year.
